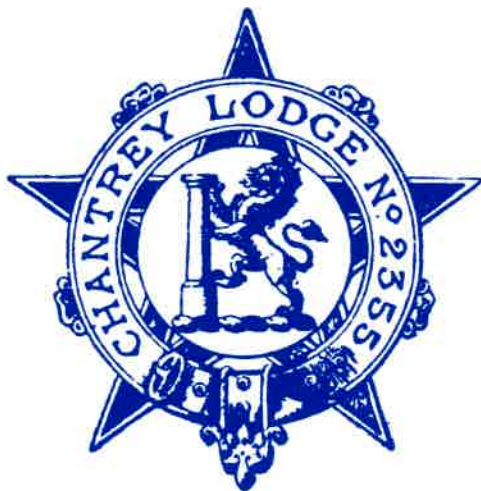

FOREWORD



DORE MASONIC HALL

We who attend our Masonic Meetings at Dore are justly proud of the wonderful building in which we meet and conduct our ceremonies. We feel that it is quite natural for visitors attending Dore for the first time to think that the premises were purpose built for our fraternity. This, however, is not the case, as we who are members of Lodges at Dore know.

On the 17th May, 1848, The Sheffield and Rotherham Licensed Victuallers Association commenced building (at Grimesthorpe between Rotherham and Sheffield City Centre), what they described as an Asylum for Poor and Distressed members of that society. The building was completed in 1850 and on the 17th May that year the first occupants took up residence. The building was said to be set in very pleasant green fields and woodlands. It would appear this tranquility did not last very long due to heavy industry moving into that area soon afterwards.

Because of this, new premises were sought and the Licensed Victuallers Association looked out to what at that time was Derbyshire and in 1877, the land on which the present Dore Masonic Hall stands, was purchased for the sum of £6,000. This was for five and a half acres of land and a pair of semi-detached houses. (These still stand next to the Masonic Hall at the corner of Dore Road).

The foundation stone was laid on the 6th June, 1877 by the Rt. Honourable Lord Edward Cavendish, on a building designed by J. B. Mitchell. The cost of the building, which included twelve cottages and a reading room/library, was £5,700. This did not include the cost of the boundary walls.

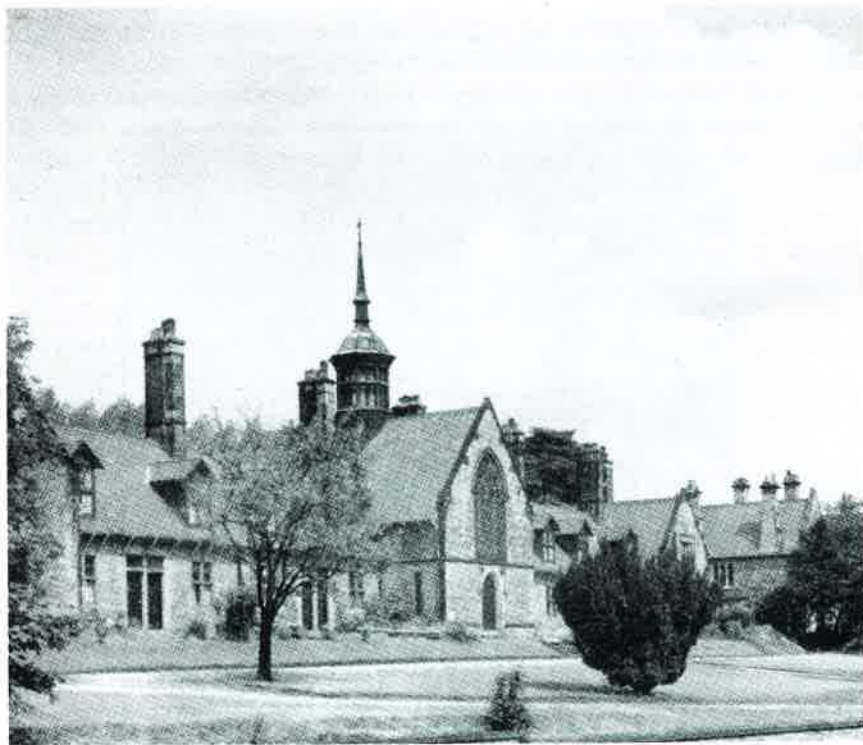
The building was opened in a very grand manner by James Arthur Roebuck, Member of Parliament for Sheffield, on the 24th July, 1879. A reception was held in a large marquee at the rear of the premises. Many distinguished guests attended and the speeches were long and numerous. The occasion was such that it merited four full columns in the Sheffield Daily Telegraph the following morning.

In front of the building is a large Gothic style monument to the memory of Alderman Thomas Wiley who was the donor of the first fifty guineas for the original building at Grimesthorpe. The stone was brought from the site at Grimesthorpe and the top of the monument remodelled before it was erected in the place where it now stands.

In it's hey-day the building was surrounded by a large garden which included bowling greens and seating areas for the residents.

Whilst looking into the history of this building of ours a very

interesting point came to light. The foundation stone at Dore was laid on the 6th June, 1877, and some five weeks later, on the 18th July, 1877 Colonel Sir Henry Edwards, Bart. Provincial Grand Master of Yorkshire West Riding opened the newly built Sheffield Masonic Hall in Surrey Street. It is a peculiar twist of history that one hundred years later, the building which was designed and built for the Licensed Victuallers Association is now a Masonic Hall, whilst the purpose built Masonic Hall in Surrey Street is now a Public House!

Sir Francis Chantrey, R.A., F.R.S.

The Lodge was named after Sir Francis Chantrey, R.A., F.R.S. who was born on the 7th April, 1781 – almost one hundred years before the lodge was formed. He was the son of a small tenant farmer at Jordanthorpe in the County of Derbyshire. The house in which he started his very illustrious life still stands and though somewhat enlarged is still a private dwelling. There is a very good picture of it in the foyer of Dore Masonic Hall, which was painted by W.Bro. George Carnhill, of Beauchief Abbey Lodge.

Francis Chantrey attended the local school and there is nothing to suggest that he showed any promise as an artist in his early years. After leaving school he worked for a short time for a grocer in nearby Sheffield and then became apprenticed to a man called Ramsey who was a wood carver and a dealer in prints and plaster models. It was here that his artistic talents began to show and these were encour-

aged by a man called J. Raphael Smith. It was at this time that he began to draw landscapes and portraits in pencil and to carve in stone.

He set up rooms at No. 24 Paradise Square, Sheffield and here he produced a great many portraits of influential people of the Sheffield area. On the 22nd April, 1802, he advertised 'Portraits in crayon and miniatures, from two to three guineas each' in the Sheffield Iris, which also reported that he was studying at the Royal Academy, London, although he was never admitted as a full time student.

His first exhibit at the Royal Academy in 1804 was a portrait in oils of D. Wales, with whom he was living in London at that time and who's daughter Francis Chantrey married a few years later.

He was very quickly acclaimed by the artistic world, perhaps more as a sculptor than a painter, although he painted the portraits of many famous people of the time. Without delving too deeply into his work it is only right to mention some of his better known works. Possibly the most famous sculpture is the group of 'Sleeping Children' in Litchfield Cathedral. There were also many busts of famous people including George III, Sir Walter Scott, Tennyson, Robert Peel, James Watt, Lord Nelson, and the sculptures of 'The Three Admirals' for the Greenwich Naval Hospital and 'Faith, Hope and Charity' in the foyer of Sheffield Royal Infirmary.

He later became an Associate of the Royal Academy and was Knighted in 1835. He died in London in 1841 and was buried in Norton Church yard in a position which he had previously selected for his grave.

Sir Francis Chantrey did not have any children and he left all his estate to be used for the purchase of works of art for the nation after the death of his wife. She died some thirty years later in 1875 and as a result of the Chantrey bequest this nation of ours has the benefit of many fine works of art.

He was a man of such stature and such a wonderful Operative Mason that it would take some considerable time to list his many artistic achievements. With regard to his connections with Freemasonry enquiries show that a Francis L. Chantrey was initiated into the Lodge of Union (pre Union times), now Lodge No. 116 on the Register of the United Grand Lodge of England, on the 5th April, 1813. He became a joining member of Somerset House and Inverness Lodge on 20th December, 1813. According to Grand Lodge, payments were made in the name of Francis L. Chantrey until 1818. Nothing Masonically appears to be known after that date.

CENTENARY OF CHANTREY LODGE No. 2355

Before we look into the founding of Lodges at Dore, perhaps we had better explain why Lodges belonging to the Masonic Province of Derbyshire hold their meetings in a building in the geographic County of South Yorkshire and therefore the Masonic Province of Yorkshire West Riding. This situation is due solely to the many county boundary changes which have occurred during the last sixty or seventy years. When the building we know as the Dore Masonic Hall was built and the first Lodge was held there, it was situated well inside the Derbyshire county boundary.

In the early 1880's there were about 2000 Masonic Lodges in the United Grand Lodge of England. Of these, 22 were in the Masonic Province of Derbyshire.

In 1887 the following appeared in a Derbyshire newspaper... "Notwithstanding the terrible anathemas which have been heaped upon it, Freemasonry has continued to spread in every direction. Within the limits of the British Empire its development has been remarkable in recent years". At this time the Deputy Provincial Grand Master, H. C. Okeover, stated that he had consecrated fourteen new Lodges in the District. There were three Lodges in the North and North-East of the county, Scarsdale Lodge No. 681 at Chesterfield, High Peak Lodge No. 1952 (at the time meeting at Chapel en le Frith) and Dorothy Vernon Lodge No. 2129 meeting at Bakewell.

Bearing in mind the quickest form of travel was by rail, it meant that very few of the Derbyshire Freemasons living in this particular part of the county were able to visit Lodges in their own Province. However, because of the easy access to Sheffield by train from Dore & Topley Railway Station the Masonic Hall in Surrey Street was readily available to them. Because of this, some eminent Freemasons living in the Dore area, began looking into the possibility of forming a Lodge within the Province of Derbyshire. The instigator in this project was Major William Boden, P.P.J.G.W. in the Province of Derbyshire and a Past Master of Royal Sussex Lodge No. 353, Burton on Trent. At this time he was a brewery manager in Sheffield, living in what is now Dore Road.

The first meeting proposing the forming of a Lodge in Dore area was held by kind permission of a Mrs. Davys in the billiard room of her home at New Road, Dore, on 23rd January, 1890. This house is still standing and in use and is now known as No. 2 Dore Road. Present at this meeting were W. Bro. W. Boden, Royal Sussex Lodge

No. 353; W. Bro. H. Styring, Wentworth Lodge No; 1239, Bros. J. F. and E. Atkinson, Royal Brunswick Lodge No. 296; and Bro. G. Slater, Isle of Axholme Lodge No. 1482.

Several meetings were held and the Warrant of Chantry Lodge was granted in March 1890 by the Grand Master, H.R.H. The Prince of Wales. The Lodge was consecrated on Wednesday, 30th July that year by the Deputy Provincial Grand Master, H. C. Okeover in the very room where we hold our meetings today. The records show that 71 people attended the meeting which opened at 3.00 p.m. and afterwards they travelled by train from Dore and Totley Station to Sheffield. The banquet for this memorable occasion was held at the Sheffield Masonic Hall in Surrey Street, at a cost of 6/- each. It is very interesting to note that of the ten Officers invested that day, only one, the Worshipful Master, W. Bro. Boden, came from a Derbyshire Lodge. Of the others, five came from Sheffield Lodges, two from the Isle of Axholme, one from Scotland and one from the Crown of West Poona Lodge, Bombay. From this we can see that the founders of Masonry at Dore came from far and wide and great credit must go to these few early Bretheren whose efforts produced such a large and close Masonic family at Dore. Not only did they found a new Lodge but they had to find new premises and all the Masonic furnishing to go with it.

The premises which were found had to be rented from the Licenced Victuallers Trust Association who were the previous owners of our present premises. The main meeting hall and one cottage were rented and all the Masonic furniture was donated by founder members.

During the early years things moved fast in Chantrey Lodge. It was quite common to have double and sometimes triple ceremonies and on occasions the records show a first and a third degree ceremony on the same day. The first initiate into Chantrey Lodge on 27th August, 1890 was one Joseph William Wilson. He was appointed Steward of the Lodge on 15th July, 1891 and installed in the Masters Chair on 3rd July, 1895. That year also saw the first Acting Provincial Officer from Chantrey Lodge, when W. Bro. J. F. Atkinson, was appointed Provincial Junior Grand Warden.

September 1900 saw the changing of the Lodge bye-laws which enabled the day of the Lodge meetings to be changed from Wednesday to the third Friday in the month. Although there is no record for the reason behind this move, tradition informs us that many of the Lodge members at that time were travelling salesmen and were away from home during the week and Friday night was far more convenient to them. In November of that year it was proposed that a Chantrey Lodge of Instruction should be formed and with the usual Chantrey speed this was done and the first meeting of the Lodge of Instruction took place on the 7th December, 1900.

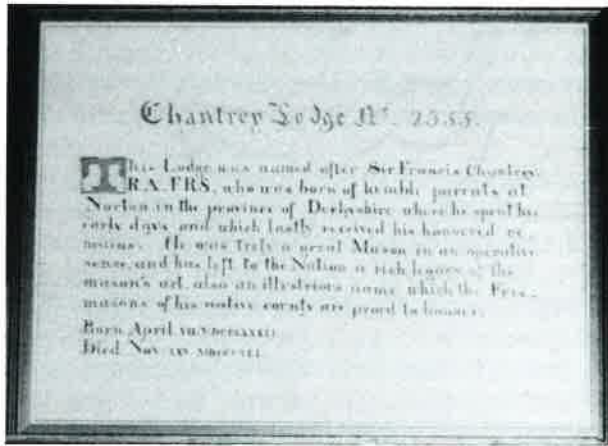
1902 saw the Annual Installation changed from July to October in each year.

1909 was another very significant year for Chantrey Lodge when our first daughter lodge was formed. Hope Valley Lodge 3379 was consecrated on 17th August.

On 21st April, 1911 the petition for the forming of Chantrey Royal Arch Chapter was signed.

At the Installation meeting held 18th October, 1912 an unusual situation arose. The Lodge was opened in the second degree, but as the Master Elect was already the serving Master of Hope Valley Lodge a dispensation from the United Grand Lodge of England had to be read before he could be presented to the Lodge and installed as Master of Chantrey Lodge.

In the early part of 1915 arrangements were made with the British Red Cross for the premises, owned by the Licence Victuallers Association, to be taken over and used as a military hospital for the duration of hostilities. A plate at the front of the building commemorates this. This meant that Chantrey Lodge had to find a temporary home, and Hope Valley Lodge, who at that time were holding their meetings at the Marquis of Granby Hotel at Bamford, kindly offered the use of their Lodge room and Lodge furniture. This was readily accepted and the meetings of May and June 1915 were held there. The July meeting of that year was moved to the Assembly Rooms,

Millhouses Lane, Sheffield and continued to be held there until May 1919. During that period a second daughter Lodge, Beauchief Abbey No. 3793, was consecrated in May 1917.

After the war ended Chantrey and Beauchief Abbey Lodges moved back to Dore and a third daughter lodge, King Egbert No. 4288, was consecrated in 1921.

At the January 1926 meeting a proposition was put before the Lodge that a committee be formed to look into the possibility of improvements being made to the Lodge room and facilities. This proposition was carried and the Dore Masonic Hall Buildings Committee, later to be called the Dore Masonic Hall Management Committee, was formed. The Committee comprised the W.M., the Secretary and three members of Chantrey Lodge and the W.M. and three members from each daughter lodge. This committee negotiated the renting of a further cottage from the L.V.A. and this joined the existing Masonic Rooms. The cost of these improvements was £1,848 of which L.V.A. Benevolent Fund contributed £900. At that time they also granted a further twenty years' lease with an option for a further ten years. Chantrey Lodge remained the tenants with the other Lodges as sub-tenants.

On 15th July, 1927 a petition was signed for the founding of Chantrey's fourth daughter lodge, Ryecroft Lodge No. 4974 and then 1931 saw the founding of the Dore Association of Installed Masters.

Over the years visitors to Dore have made many pleasant comments about the wonderful organ and the music that comes from it. However, this was not part of the original building nor was it provided by the L.V.A Trust. It was, in fact, bought by the brethren of Chantrey Lodge assisted by donations from the other Lodges meeting at Dore in 1932. The instrument was bought from a private house in Buxton, when it was offered for sale following the death of the owner. The agreed price, which included the dismantling, packaging, transporting, re-erecting and any small renewals, was not to exceed £250. The balcony, which was part of the original building, had to be altered slightly to accommodate it. It is extremely difficult to imagine the ceremonies at Dore without the music which it provides and we who attend there owe a great deal to those brethren who contributed to it's aquisition.

No meetings were held during the month of September 1939 following this message being received from the Secretary of the United Grand Lodge of England.... "Having regard to the Emergency Orders from H.M. Government, all Masonic meetings should be

suspended for a time". However, the October installation did take place that year after a further letter sanctioning the resumption of Masonic meetings had been received. Authority was then given for the W.M. for that current year to be elected and installed on the same day.

At the installation meeting of 1940 there is a note in the Minutes which states "Seventy-five Bretheren sat down to High Tea at 5.55 p.m. and the proceedings closed at 8.15 p.m., owing to the blackout".

When one looks into the Minutes of the meetings of the Lodge during the war years, it shows how determined were our predecessors in carrying on their Masonic commitment. Meetings continued throughout the war and to enable them to do this the meetings during the winters of 1940, '41, '42 and '43 were held on Saturday afternoons. They were always very well attended and on most occasions some form of refreshment was provided.

Friday, 16th July, 1948, saw the signing of the petition for the forming of Chantrey's youngest daughter lodge and Lodge St. Peter No. 6763, was consecrated on 26th March, 1949.

It was during the 1940's that Chantrey Lodge began looking into the possibilities of purchasing the premises we now know as Dore Masonic Hall. The Dore Masonic Hall Co. Ltd., was incorporated on 25th August, 1951 and was instrumental in purchasing the land and buildings in which we now hold our meetings and social gatherings.

It is often said that one should not live in the past, but when one attends Lodges at Dore this is very difficult, as the very room itself echoes pleasant memories of what has taken place there. Most of the original Lodge furniture is still in use. The Worshipful Masters Chair was donated by the first Treasurer of Chantrey Lodge, W. B. Jowitt. The plate commemorating this was attached to the chair at the request of his family after his death. There is a photograph and the Regalia of the first W.M. Major William Boden. As one sits there it is interesting to reflect that in years gone by our predecessors in Chantrey Lodge were making donations to aid Freemasons in South Africa during the conflict with the Boers. There are also very pleasant memories of the social side of Freemasonry if one pictures Ladies' Nights and other functions which were held at Dore. Research shows that palm trees, giant ferns and other potted plants were brought in to decorate and beautify it, whilst ladies in crinolines and gentlemen in tail coats and bat-wing collars danced the night away.

In connection with the holding of Ladies' Night at Dore, in 1902 a proposition was put before the Lodge "that the venue for the

Ladies' Night should be changed to the Victoria Hall in Fargate, Sheffield" The reason for this was that many of the members lived in Sheffield and it would be more convenient for travelling. The proposal was not accepted and a few weeks later the following circular was issued: "Ladies' Night, January 1903 is to be held at The Masonic Hall, Dore, 7.30 p.m. to 1.30 a.m. Entertainment consisting of songs, recitations and dances have been arranged. Tickets Five Shillings for Gentlemen and Three Shillings and Sixpence for the Ladies, inclusive of supper and refreshments, Tickets restricted to Lodge members and their families. First 80 applicants only". The circular went on to say "For the convenience of Bretheren living in Sheffield, arrangements have been made with Messrs. Thompson and Grunwell, Cab Proprietors – a double journey for four persons eleven shillings, for a single journey for four persons after midnight seven shillings".

In those early days it was quite usual to have a Lodge meeting which was not followed by a Festive Board, but it was usual to have a banquet on Installation days. Because of the lack of amenities at the Masonic Hall in those days, these appeared to have been held at many different locations, but they all seemed to have one thing in common on the menu – "Chantrey Pudding". This must have been something very special but try as one might, the recipe of this wonderful dish has not come to light and seems to have disappeared for ever.

There was a very popular song of the 1960's that went something like "I threw a pebble into the water and I watched the ripples grow". The pebble thrown into the waters of Freemasonry by the founder members of Chantrey Lodge at Dore one hundred years ago has certainly caused ripples to grow and we who have the privilege to be part of the ripples today should be justly proud of those early Bretheren and do everything in our power to make sure that they carry on growing.



ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Researching and preparing this short history of Chantrey Lodge and the founding of Freemasonry at Dore has been a great privilege and honour and has given me a great deal of pleasure.

When one looks into the history of any movement which has existed for one hundred years there are bound to be many members whose names come to the fore, for the work they have done and for the achievements they have made. Chantrey Lodge is no exception. We have a great many Worshipful Bretheren and Bretheren whose contributions to Freemasonry are worthy of them being remembered by the present membership and indeed they are remembered with great affection. I hope that at some later date I shall have the privilege of writing a more detailed history of Freemasonry at Dore and giving some of those individual members the honour they deserve.

I would personally like to thank both them and the present day Worshipful Bretheren and Bretheren without whose help the booklet could not have been produced.
